Extracts from Macnab Memorial Trust deed registered 27 July 1988

Considering that:

- 1 I the said James Charles Mcanab of Macnab have conveyed to myself and (There then follows the names of Trustees)..... as Trustees of the Macnab Memorial Trust, the burial island known as Inchbuie, lying in the river Dochart at Killin, in the County of Perth, and the right fishing for salmon from the banks thereof, and others.
- 2 The purpose of the said conveyance was to ensure that the said island and salmon fishings and others would be retained in posterity for the benefit of the Clan Macnab and to provide a burial place for the Chiefs of the said Clan and their families.
- 3 It has been decided to raise sufficient funds to provide for the expenses of the formation of the said trust and its administration and for the said island and for the clan generally. subject to the following conditions:-
 - 1 The Trustees will hold the said property and any funds entrusted to their care in trust for the Clan and as a memorial to Archibald, twenty second chief, his wife Alice, and to Brigadier John Francis Macnab of Barravorich, CBE, DSO.
 - 2 The use of the island of Inchbuie will be subject to the following conditions:-
 - a) Only chiefs of the clan Macnab and such member or members of the family of any Chief of Clan Macnab as may be designated by any chief of the Clan Macnab will be entitled to be buried on the island
 - b) The ashes of any other member of the Clan or of the Society may be placed or scattered on the island. Such placing or scattering may be subject to payment of a fee to be determined from time to time by the Trustees.
 - c) No memorial or headstone will be placed on the island other than those authorised by the Trustees
 - 3 Members of the public may be allowed access to the island at all convenient times. It will be in the discretion of the trustees to decide whether any charge is to be made

Extracts from the Disposition by the Chief to the Macnab Memorial Trust in 1987

- Commentary

I, James Charles Macnab of Macnab considering that:-

- 1 I am heritable proprietor of the subjects hereinafter disposed;
- 2 I have decided to set up a Trust for the purpose of administration and management of the said subjects, to be called "Macnab Memorial Trust".
- 3 The disponees hereinafter named have agreed to accept a conveyance of the said subject for the purposes of said trust without payment of any price to me;
Therefore I, the said James Charles, Macnab of Macnab, do hereby DISPONE to (There then follows the names of all the Trustees), heritably and irredeemably -

ALL and WHOLE (First) the islands known as Inchbuie or Innis Bhuidhe and Garb Innes, lying in the river Dochart at Killin in the County of Perth (second) the island lying in Loch Tay named Eilean nam Breaban (This was acquired by the Chief together with the solum of parts of Loch Tay from Armorer Countess of Breadalbane in 1963) together with:-

- 1 the bed of the river Dochart so far as surrounding said islands, up to the centre line of said river;
- 2 so far as it may belong to me and pass over the said island known as Inchbuie, the bridge over the said river Dochart;
- 3 the right to fish for salmon from the banks of the said islands in said river Dochart up to the centre line thereof;
- 4 all buildings and other erections on said islands;
- 5 the whole timber, standing and fallen, on said islands

Note:

In 1991 the Trustees sold Eilean nam Breabam in Loch Tay (known as Gull Island) to the owners of Carie and Carwhin Estate for £1,000. The island is very small and rocky a few yards (within wading distance) from the shore of their property.

In 2002 the Chief gifted title to that part of the Solum of Loch Tay owned by him to A. F. Allan and R. J. Shand in return for a donation of £5,000 to the Macnab Memorial Trust. Mr Allan and Mr Shand have since formed a Company to run a pleasure steamer on Loch Tay.

(neither Gull Island or the Solum of Loch Tay were ever part of the lands of the ancient Chiefs of Macnab).
